The 2013-2014 Long Island Zone Waterfowl Task Force

The Long Island Zone NYS Waterfowl Task Force met, on Saturday, April 27, 2013. Below are the recommendations. These will be forwarded to the USFWS for their approval. It is always possible that the Feds will overrule any or all of these recommendations. However, in recent years, they have taken the task force recommendations and implemented them. The NYSDEC has already posted the proposed seasons and dates on its website. They are:

Regular Duck Season:

Recommendation: November 28–January 26 (no split) Rationale: Traditional Thanksgiving opener and holiday weekend included. Otherwise, "late and straight"... Accommodates both those hunters wanting late and straight as well as traditionalists who enjoy going out on the holiday weekend.

Scaup (season within a season, if needed):

Recommendation: November 28–January 5 (1 scaup/day) and January 6–January 26 (last 20 days of season, 2 scaup/day)

Rationale: The later it is in the season, the more likely the birds will be in the area.

Youth Days:

Recommendation: November 9th–November 10th Rationale: Earlier in the season is too early for any action, seems to be going consistently well where it's been in the past. Older hunters will be satisfied that there is a break in between the youth hunt and the start of the regular season. Give youth hunters the maximum hunting opportunity.

Regular Canada Goose Season (Western Long Island):

Recommendation: October 5–October 20 (1st split) November 28–February 26 (2nd split)

Rationale: Accommodates those disappointed by loss of September season. Gives early hunters more weekend days, fewer hunters are out in March.

Regular Canada Goose Season (Eastern Long Island):

Recommendation: December 3-January 31

Rationale: Late and straight.

Regular Canada Goose Season (Central Long Island):

Recommendation: November 28–February 5 Rationale: Late and straight.

Late Canada Goose Season (North Shore Long Island):

Recommendation: February 6–February 13
Rationale: Begins the day after the Central zone goose season ends, allowing for maximum hunting opportunity for those that hunt both areas.

Brant Season:

Recommendation: December 28-January 26

Rationale: Late and straight

Sea Duck Season:

Recommendation: October 17-January 31

Rationale: Late and straight.

Snow Goose Season:

Recommendation: November 24–March 10 Rationale: Late and straight season.



Grass Island (The Al McCormick Marsh Project) Update

In the December 2012 issue of the SSWA newsletter, I provided the membership with a brief history of the Grass Island project, and the progress (or lack thereof) to date. I reported that SSWA was trying its best to develop renewed interest in Grass Island, and that meetings were under way with a DU biologist and others to try and make something happen. Well, of course, Super Storm Sandy had just happened, and everything was put on hold . . . and that is what I reported in December.

Here we are in June, some 6 months later, and here is where we are now. The late winter meeting never happened and the spring meeting never got off the ground. The project DU biologist, Kurt Andersen, was unable to get to NYC to move forward. This was largely because the city property which was to be included in the project was destined to take a back seat to all those other waterfront city properties which were severely damaged by the Super Storm. There are still hundreds of residences on the Staten Island shore which are in serious need of repair before they are fit to move back into. The city is not about to sink money into a shorefront project for habitat until the residences that were damaged have been repaired. This could take many more months before we see any daylight on that score. According to Kurt Andersen's assessment, without the city's support in this coastal rehab project, it just won't be able to move forward. So it seems that we are on hold indefinitely.

Well that is where we were on May 1, when I received a copy of a DU resignation letter from Kurt Andersen. It seems that Kurt was leaving DU on May 10 to work as a biologist for Maine Farmland Trust. Kurt referred all questions to Bernie Marczyk, the DU Director of Conservation Programs for the Atlantic Region, who works out of the DU Annapolis office. I had met Bernie last summer at the summer Flyway Conference, where all of this had been jump started by my inquiries. So I contacted Bernie again to find out where we are. His response was less than optimistic. He gave me the name of a DU biologist who has assumed Kurt's projects. She is Sarah Fleming, DU's NY biologist. Now DU is not sure at this time whether or not the Staten Island project will be moving forward, and apparently our project is linked to the Staten Island initiative. So it would seem that nothing is going to happen any time soon.

As a footnote, I will be going to the Atlantic Flyway Council Summer meetings in Connecticut in July, and the Annapolis DU Director of Conservation will also be at those meetings. I hope to be able to sit with him and either get an update or spark some renewed interest in Grass Island. Keep an eye out for the September newsletter . . . there should be some more news by then.

The SSWA "Buddy" Hunting Program

Last September, SSWA member Ben Sohm came up with an idea to get fellow hunters who were beginners, and/or who did not have access to boats, to experience hunting from a duckboat. The idea caught on, and several members who own duckboats volunteered to "buddy-up" with a member who didn't so that they could expand their waterfowling experience. This program was a success and we hope to continue it as we move forward into the 2013-2014 hunting season. SSWA has also been involved for some time in mentoring youth hunters, and SSWA members routinely volunteer annually on youth waterfowl weekend to take youngsters out at Hubbards Park and at Southaven Park on Youth Days. And speaking of Southaven Park, SSWA has partnered with Suffolk County in the recent past to create a handicappedaccessible duck hunting blind available for our returning Vets, wounded warriors, and other handicapped hunters. It is Blind #9, and those who are handicapped get preference at the park for that blind in the regular weekly lottery there.

Last month, I was contacted by SSWA member George Ruland, who wished to donate several dozen working decoys to SSWA under the condition that they not be sold or traded for revenue. George's request is that they be made available especially for our returning Vets who might enjoy hunting, but don't have the extensive decoy set ups to be able to hunt certain species. After speaking with George about his idea, he has agreed that these same decoys could also be used by beginning hunters, youths, and those who would benefit from our fledgling "buddy" program as well. Some of the decoys that George has donated are puddle ducks, and they will surely be welcomed as replacements for the beat up set that currently exist for use at the handicapped-access blind #9 in Southaven Park. There are a variety of other decoys as well, broadbill and other divers, and so on. These we will be sorted out and hopefully putting to good use.

At the end of this month, there is a SSWA Board of Directors meeting scheduled, and George's generous donation will be one of the topics of discussion at that meeting. We will be looking to determine the best way or ways to put these decoys to good use with returning vets, and with our youth and the new/beginning hunters that we will continue to mentor and work with. We are grateful to George for his thoughtfulness, and we hope to implement George's ideas, as these also become a regular part of our mentoring program. Watch for an up-date on this in a follow-up article in our Fall newsletter.

Recipe

Game-Hunter Style (Cacciatore) works well with upland game meats

INGREDIENTS (Makes 8-12 servings)

½ cup olive oil

2 medium onions, julienned

1 red bell pepper, julienned

1 green bell pepper, julienned

1 box fresh mushrooms, cleaned and sliced

1 28 oz. can of tomato puree

1 cup of flour

1 tablespoon salt

1 tablespoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon black pepper

1 cup white wine

Game meat, cleaned and cut into pieces

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Clean, prepare, measure, slice, & cut all ingredients in advance!
- 2. Add the salt, black pepper, and garlic powder to the flour, and mix them.
- 3. Dredge the meat through the flour to coat it. Gently shake off the excess flour.
- 4. Pre-heat the olive oil in a saucepan. Then sauté pieces of meat until light golden brown, and remove. Once all of the meat has been browned and removed, add the onions and peppers to the saucepan. Sauté until cooked.
- 5. Now add the mushrooms to the pan, and sauté until cooked.
- 6. Next, put all the meat back into the pan. Add the white wine, and cook until most of the alcohol boils down.
- 7. Add the tomato puree, basil, and more salt (to taste), cover, and stir occasionally, simmer until meat is tender. (Add a little water as needed to prevent stock from reducing too much. You want it to cook, but you do not want it to burn.)

The meat and sauce can be served right from the pan, but the sauce from the pan makes a wonderful meat sauce for Pasta or spaghetti as a side dish.

A garden salad, and a glass of wine, and . . . There you have it!

Quack's Tips

Entire books have been written about working decoys. Popular topics always include how many to use, and what type of "pattern" to use when you set them out. Whether you are setting up for puddle ducks, divers, or geese, one thing is certain. A successful decoy spread depends most of all on location. Go to where the birds want to be, before you concern yourself with the look of your decoy spread! No amount of decoy positioning, motion, color, or any other gimmick or gadget is going to overcome the handicap of hunting in a place where the birds don't want to be. So the most effect component of decoying is scouting. It has been said that in the right location, ducks and geese will come to their shadows.

After you've done your best to find a marsh or a field in which the birds want to light, concern yourself with creating the flock effect. Birds aren't lured by any one decoy, but are attracted to the composite of the flock. The shape of a single decoy, therefore isn't nearly as important as the form of the spread. So think random. Spreads that catch the eye of passing waterfowl look as though they're birds that are resting or feeding—in loose aggregation. Flocks that are alarmed almost always bunch up before they swim or fly away.

So the message here is that the best number of decoys to use is the fewest necessary to entice birds. This is where mobility is important. A handful of decoys in an area where the birds want to light is far more valuable than a huge spread in a location in which the birds have no interest in visiting.

Scouting birds takes time, and can only occur once the birds have arrived for the season. So take care to make all your other preparations for hunting long before the migration arrives. Then you will be able to spend necessary time scouting, both before and during the season.

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
