



Talking About Dogs — Get the Right Start

Are you getting a puppy? This is my favorite time of the year to get a puppy. Let's get the right start.

I like to have a very clear idea as to what my adult dog will be. He will be a good citizen and will be well socialized around people, dogs, boats, road noise, and other environmental factors. My dog will also be obedient with off lead obedience as my goal. He will be kept in working condition and will be a good water dog. He will have to sit when I give one blast of the whistle—often at great distances. He will be steady. He will take a directional hand signal (cast) for blind retrieves.

These are some issues that I consider "Preliminaries":

- A. Housebreaking: I use a crate for this
- B. *Name recognition*: Call his name and treat him when he looks
- C. Nipping Cry out "ouch": This is what puppies do. Change tactics if needed.
- D. Collar: Get him used to wearing a puppy collar.No choke collar until 6 months.

Next is puppy obedience. This is taught with treats. Use very small pieces for training treats. You can teach:

- A. Sit
- B. Here
- C. Heeling
- D. Down

At 6 months my obedience changes from puppy style to formal obedience. This is obedience with the use of a little pressure in order to insure compliance. Pressure is in the form of a quick tug on the leash while the dog wears a chain choke collar. The sequence is to give the command first and then a tug on the leash if necessary.

The Basic Retrieve

You can throw a rolled up sock in a hallway and have the puppy bring it back to you. When the puppy is maybe 10-12 weeks old you can start using a puppy bumper for retrieving in the yard. Flat buckle collar and short leash will help you control the dog.



At 14 weeks you can use a helper to throw bumpers and fire a starter pistol from a distance of at least 50 feet. The dog will learn that the gunshot means retrieve. You can gently restrain the dog to encourage steadiness.

At 6 months the pup should be able to do simple single marks up to 100 yards. Since this will be a duck dog I would avoid having the dog quarter and hunt for game right now. You want to emphasize marking ability.

At about 6 months the puppy will start teething. This is time to stop the retrieving because the puppy's gums will be sore and bleeding and you will probably get sloppy retrieves.

Somewhere during the first 6 months you will want to introduce the puppy to feathers—a duck wing, a pigeon, a duck—any of these is good. Also, the puppy should be gently introduced to water. Make sure that the water is relatively warm and you have a gradually sloping shoreline.

Some don'ts: Don't throw endless retrieves, don't throw sticks for your dog, and don't play tug of war with the dog (some may argue with me about this).

Yes, this is my favorite time of the year to get a puppy. I must admit that I thoroughly enjoy training my dogs. Patience is a must but I know that my dog is more than a pet. My dog is a working dog, a duck dog, a dog that lives to retrieve.




The President's Corner

Characters You Never Want to Meet in Your Duck Blind

If you have ever travelled to another state or province to do some guided duck hunting, you may have been coerced into hunting in a blind with one or more strangers (and we are not talking about the guide here). I have had this happen more than once, and I hated it. Even though I always "insist" on no strangers hunting with me when I am booking the hunt, it can happen anyway. Sadly, some guides are not true to their word. You enter into an agreement for a hunt in good faith. You mail off a sizeable deposit, spend hundreds on air fare, car rental, and accommodations, and have some expectation that your wishes will be followed. So you arrive at the "lodge" and meet the guide, who tells you there has been an unavoidable change in plans and now 1 or 2 other hunters have to join your hunt. At this point, you are between a rock and a hard place. Sure, you can put your foot down and refuse the hunt. In that case, it's good bye deposit, not to mention the hundreds you have already spent travelling. So you say to yourself "how bad can it be?" Well, a recent article I read answers this question better than I ever could.

There is a very talented and humorous outdoor magazine story writer by the name of Bruce Cochran. His article in the spring 2014 issue of Delta Waterfowl is definitely entertaining to read. The title is "Oh No, Not Him!" and it describes six characters you never want to meet in your duck blind. For any and all of you who can get your hands on that article, I recommend that you read it.

For all of you who do not have access to Delta's magazine, I will try to paraphrase and give you the highlights. The author suggests that the guide or outfitter puts you in a duck blind or goose pit with a total stranger. You don't know if he is a safe gun handler. Hell you don't even know if he is sober! As the title description indicates, Bruce Cochran describes 6 hunter stereotypes to avoid, and I think many of us have encountered each of these. Since I mentioned safety concerns, let's

start with the **Loose Cannon**. This is the guy who does scary things with his shotgun. For example, he doesn't pay attention to where it is pointed, and if you step out of the



blind (because nature calls or to fix the pose on some decoys) you hear the tell-tale Ker-clunk of his

semi-auto being loaded, or you look over at him in the blind and you see that the safety is off.

A second type is what he calls the **Chatty Cathy.** This guy has not shut up since he got into the blind! You haven't even witnessed him take a breath, but he has been rambling on for a half-hour. And he is loud. His



voice carries in the quiet of nature. Maybe he talks just to hear himself talk. How blunt do you have to be before he gets the hint?

Next is **the Instructor**. This is the guy who wants to correct all your shooting mistakes. "Next time try giving it more lead" or "you need to shoulder the gun correctly" or "do you know why you missed that shot?"





How about the **Shot Hog**. There are 2 ducks coming straight in, and as you raise your gun to take the bird closest to your side of the blind, he shoots it down before swinging onto the duck on his side. Then he sticks his hand

up for a congratulatory "high five."

Ever meet up with the **Rambunctious Retriever Guy**? He has good of Buster with him. Five minutes in the blind with Buster tells you that Buster (all 120 lbs. of him) needs more than just a "little work." He



needs an electronic collar. No, make that a nuclear collar. You are working a pair of mallards with your call when Buster leaps out of the blind and flairs the birds . . . could be how Buster got his name. Back in the blind, ol' Buster starts entertaining romantic notions about your leg.



My favorite, though, is the **Duck Claimer**. This guy claims he shot every bird that hits the water. If you challenge his claim, he asks, "Oh, did you shoot too?" When a

bird is falling, he shouts "I got it" before it splashes down.

These are all fun examples of some hunter stereotypes. It is not too much fun, however, when it's really happening on your dream hunt.

Quack's Tips

Scouting in the off season can produce potential new places to hunt. When choosing new locations, keep in mind that you never want to be forced to position your blind facing the morning sun. Coping with light in your eyes is (at the very least) a hassle, and will prevent you from seeing some approaching birds. Also, the sun on your face will allow passing ducks to spot you.

So when the season arrives, and you head out to the new spot for the first time, try to put the sun at your back. Also be sensitive to the wind conditions. Birds land into the wind. Arrange your decoys close enough to the blind to allow for easy gunning (no more than 25-30 yds.). Give the birds a landing zone - an opening in the spread 20-30 yards across. Very often, the birds will head directly for this "hole." This can provide ideal shooting opportunities if the opening is placed right out in front of your blind.




